1. SCOPING

1.1 What are the aims of the policy, service/service change or contract?

To provide a Development Plan to shape the future of development in the District by providing the planning policy framework to:

- Shape the pattern, amount and type of future development;
- Protect and enhance the assets of both the natural and built environment;
- Determine planning proposals;
- Support the delivery of other Council policy documents.

1.2 Who does the service/policy/contract affect? Who are the main customers (internal or external)?

The policies contained within the District Plan have the potential to affect anyone who lives, works or visits Mid Sussex and also those who are outside the administrative boundaries of the District.

The main customers of the District Plan are:

- Members of the public;
- District, Town and Parish Councillors:
- Those involved in the development industry such as developers, landowners, agents;
- Organisations and individuals that provide services to residents and organisations;
- Organisations and individuals that represent groups of people;
- Internal customers include those service areas responsible for decisions that require consultation such as the Housing and Leisure Departments.

Assessment of Impact and Needs

The District Plan will be prepared in a number of stages. This Equalities Assessment looks at both the proposed content of the District Plan and the process of consultation. A Community Involvement Plan, informed by the results of this Assessment, details how the consultation will be undertaken.

This Assessment will be reviewed, and if necessary revised, for each stage of the District Plan.

Evidence

The strategy and policies contained within the District Plan have been shaped by extensive public consultation including that undertaken for the preparation of the draft Core Strategy (of which work was halted on in June 2010).

- Work first commenced on the District Plan (as a 'Core Strategy') in 2004. This included a number of workshops to discuss issues of concern for the District.
- Further consultation was undertaken summer 2006, which sought views on possible housing distribution and comments on other policy areas
 for inclusion within the District Plan. This consultation took place electronically via email. Responses from the seldom heard groups were
 limited during this exercise.
- The first formal consultation on the Core Strategy took place in early 2008. This consultation targeted all stakeholder groups and included the general public. A series of public meetings and exhibitions were held and notices were published in the local press to encourage as many people as possible to respond to the consultation. Again very limited response was received from seldom heard groups. However many of the issues raised more generally during the consultation have been used to inform this Equality Assessment.
- Other Strategies prepared by the District Council, including the Sustainable Communities Strategy and Leisure and Cultural Strategy, link to the aims and objectives of the District Plan. Responses made to these documents have been taken into consideration during the preparation of this Assessment.
- In order to be able to undertake a robust assessment of the impact of the District Plan on protected groups it will be necessary to ensure targeted consultation with these groups, during the preparation of further draft versions of the Plan.
