Appendix D5 - Environment: Ashdown Forest

There is a long history of cooperation and partnership work on matters affecting the Ashdown Forest SPA and SAC: recreational pressure and atmospheric pollution. Since at least 2008, affected local authorities and Natural England (a prescribed body) have been working together to address these matters and seek solutions. This partnership work has continued through the preparation of the District Plan from its early stages to Submission and beyond. Meetings are scheduled when needed.

The table below sets out the key outcomes of the partnership groups for Ashdown Forest from April 2018 to July 2024 (adoption of the District Plan 2014-2031 to Submission of the District Plan 2021-2039). Agendas and minutes/notes of these meetings have not been provided due to the key outputs from these meetings being set out in the table below and elsewhere, such as SoCGs and the HRA.

Explanation of how the cooperation has influenced plan making

There is an agreed strategic solution to address recreational pressure at Ashdown Forest which is reflected in planning policy (Policy DPC6). This is the same policy in the Adopted District Plan and there has been no change in circumstance to require any change to this policy. Some minor clarification has been made to ensure consistency with the current application of the policy, best practice and other local authorities.

The Joint SAMM Strategy is a strategic co-ordinated partnership approach to mitigation that aims to manage visitors on-site at Ashdown Forest. The SAMM Partnership for Ashdown Forest is actively working to deliver access management projects to address issues arising from visitor pressure and to undertake monitoring at both Ashdown Forest and the five operational SANG sites.

The Ashdown Forest Working Group is a group of local authorities working together to consider a strategic approach to considering air quality at Ashdown Forest in order to inform Habitats Regulations Assessments for Local Plans. The Ashdown Forest Working Group has commissioned joint air quality monitoring. The Ashdown Forest Working Group has also commissioned consultants to develop joint transport modelling for Ashdown Forest.
